## ELIZABETH DENHAM

Commissioner Elizabeth Denham was appointed Information and Privacy Commissioner for BC in May, 2010. Promoting privacy rights is Commissioner Denham's top priority. Ms. Denham has led investigations into several high-profile privacy breaches and

has completed systemic reviews that examine the impact of new and emerging technologies on privacy. Ms. Denham has led the B.C. office to take a proactive approach to the enforcement of access and privacy laws. A newly-created policy and technology team conducts systemic investigations and monitors the latest developments in access and privacy. Ms. Denham is known for spearheading collaborative projects with her federal and provincial colleagues, including Canada's latest guidance called "Getting Accountability Right through Privacy Management Programs," which was co-authored by Ms. Denham. The document has received international attention for its innovative and practical approach to privacy management in the private sector.

## JENNIFER DAVID

Jennifer David has spent her career working in and with Aboriginal organizations providing communications and management support. She was the Director of Communications at APTN for five years and has since run her own business. She recently wrote a book about the launch of

APTN. She is a member of Chapleau Cree First Nation in northern Ontario and currently lives in Ottawa, where she is a partner and manager of an Aboriginal management consulting company called Stonecircle Consulting.
